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MAMMON AND THE ARCHER

PRE-READING ACTIVITY 1: CROSSWORD PUZZLE

- 3. If you do not know the word, look it up in a dictionary.





WHILE-READING ACTIVITY 2: CAUSE AND EFFECT


It is important to understand cause-and-the effect relationships in the story--how one event leads to the next one.




What does Anthony talk to Richard (his son) about?







What is Anthony's solution to the problem?




How does Ellen help Richard to talk to the girl?


